

At Rusthall St Paul's many teaching and learning opportunities exist in our curriculum to promote 'British Values'. They are also taught through our spiritual, moral, social and cultural curriculum.

Below are some examples of how we promote British Values

Democracy

Every year the pupils elect a School Council who work alongside the Senior Leadership Team on discussing issues raised by the pupils in school. All pupils are given a 'voice' to communicate e.g. through the 'Worry Tree, School Council suggestion board, pupil questionnaire

Rule of Law

Our Behaviour Policy promotes praise and sanctions which enables pupils to make decisions and choices that are acceptable to the school and community at large. Pupils are helped to learn to manage their behaviour and accept responsibility for their actions. Our school rules and values pervade throughout everything we do and help pupils feel safe and secure. Older pupils receive visits from the police and a magistrate who talk about how the rules and laws of the land govern us and keep us safe.

Individual Liberty

At Rusthall St Paul's we encourage pupils to make choices within a safe and nurturing environment which will then lead them to become independent free thinking citizens. Giving choices may be through one of our Chilli Challenges or Independent Learning Projects. We help pupils understand that they have a right to say 'no' e.g. to requests from other pupils and how to say this in a fair and equitable manner.

Mutual Respect

One of school values is **RESPECT** . Pupils learn how their behaviour can impact on others. All members of the school community treat each other with respect.

Tolerance of those of different Faiths and Beliefs

Worship and the RE curriculum are carefully planned to promote diversity with the children. As part of RE the children learn about different faiths and take part in visits to different places of worship e.g. Neasden Temple
