within their school during school hours. 
York Class

It has been another busy week in Winchester class. In English we have started to write our reports about wolves using all the skills we have been learning in our English lessons. We have continued to learn about the values of tens and ones and looked at different ways to partition numbers and write number sentences to show this. During PE we have been



working on our skills of

rolling balls between gates and being able to use simple under arm throws to hit a target accurately, which we found great fun. We are all looking forward to another fun filled week next week.

Exeter Class

In maths we have been busy practising our number facts using hit the button and practising times tables on TTRockstars. Here is the link if you would like to practise at home: Hit the Button - Quick fire maths practise for 6-11 year olds (topmarks.co.uk) This Week: 82.41% We have also been looking at place value and developing our mathematical language This Year: 88.84% being able to explain words like digit. We have been creating visual representations as well and number sentences. As part of our history lesson, we all went to the ICT suite to research about the Iron Age. I was particularly impressed with everyone using search engines and being able to pick out key facts which is not an easy task! **Durham Class** This week in English, we have been 'interviewing' Zoe, where the children were looking at embedding their skills in using relative pronouns to extend sentences and provide more information. They have also begun to look at speech and how dialogue is shown within a narrative. In Geography, we have been investigating the links between rising carbon This Week: 89.47% dioxide levels and the rising global temperature. The children drew their own graphs and This Year: 94.04% then looked at ways in which humans can make small changes to make positive changes for the environment. They then collated all of the information they have looked over the last 3 weeks and created an information leaflet. The children loved including their favourite fact that they have learnt: One cow can produce enough methane to fill 15 party balloons every day! **Rochester Class** In Rochester Class we have been investigating the questions 'Can we save our world?' We learned that our world is made up of many carefully balanced biomes which plants and animals have adapted to thrive in. Just a small change in the weather can damage these environments. This impact also . reaches humans. Settlements can be devastated by a single natural disaster such as flood or drought. One of the biggest This Week: 83% problems is climate change. We looked at graphs which This Year: 91.33% show a pattern between the increase of fossil fuels the world has burned since the industrial revolution, the increase in the release of carbon dioxide and the gradual long-term rise in the Earth's temperature. We concluded that humans are the main cause of the increase in greenhouse gases being released into the atmosphere, from burning fossil fuels to removing forests which are carbon sinks, and therefore humans should be the

answer.
