
KS2 Carol Concert

Staff Development and Training



This week our staff development was based around the principles of de-escalation. Globally there is a far better understanding around the idea that children's behaviour is communication and that when they are at the peak of an emotion, they are not in a position to be able have rational conversations. As adults, we all have ways of processing our emotions and we know what we need to be able to calm. However children need support with this and we have been developing our range of approaches.

We thought carefully about how behaviour can be caused, escalated and stabilised. In the moment it is not abut consequence or sanction, but safety and well-

being. This does not mean that behaviour is accepted but consequence is discussed at the appropriate time for all so that everyone understands what happened.

was being kind to him. Bella noticed Tabassum pick up Charlie W's pencil and give it to him when he dropped it.


In English we have published our news articles with professional headlines, subheadings, photo captions, interviews, and concluding statements; and in Maths we have continued working on our times tables and have been practicing multiplication and division facts.

Durham

Another excellent week in Durham this week! In History, we built on our knowledge of the Prime Ministers during World War 2 and the impact they had on Britain succeeding in the war. The children wrote some fantastic speeches in role as Neville Chamberlain declaring the beginning of the war. They then explored the change in leadership from Chamberlain to Churchill and how this affected the attitudes and approach to the war. The children compared the ways in which both of these leaders were portrayed and even thought about what they would have done in their position. In English, we have been building on our knowledge of semi colons and colons and how these can be used within writing. I was absolutely astounded by the children's writing and how effectively they implemented this writing skill.

Rochester



We have fully immersed ourselves in the story of two children who were evacuated to Budmouth point. Their mother has signed them up for voluntary evacuation and sent them to live in the safety of a quiet, rural village with their sister's pen friend. Or so she thinks. Sukie's pen friend was not Queenie; the quick sand and stray bombs are not safe; and the impending demolitions of the lighthouse means the village is not quiet. Plus, there is the added extra of secret codes, missing logbook entries and socks- lots of socks! In English we are writing a formal persuasive letter to prevent the coastguard demolishing the lighthouse. He thinks it is leading the Germans to

London but little does he know it is getting others to much needed safety. Although a fictional story, we have been able to draw parallels between the experiences of real evacuees and make links to other key events in WW11. In history, our journey has taken us from the causes of WW11, to the change of Prime Minister and on to the impact this had on the home front. We are thoroughly enjoying our book, Letters from the lighthouse, and asking and answering questions about WW11.
