Thought for the Week



Picture news is running a new campaign to help get children and families thinking about important topics. This week's thought for the week is: is an

e-reader better than a book?

A study from the university of Valencia, Spain, found that reading books could boost skills by 6-8 times more than digital reading, for example on a tablet. The study, published in the Review of Education Research, also found that while there is a negative relationship between digital reading and comprehension for primary pupils but it is positive in secondary schools.

Child Anxiety

Kent Emotional Well Being Team have asked us to share details of their online platform which is designed to help parents and carers to learn techniques to help their child (aged 5 to 12 years old) to overcome difficulties with worries/fears/anxiety.

The platform has supported parents and carers to support their child with a range of worries for related to going to school, bedtime fears, specific phobias e.g. dogs, insects, injections.

The intervention is a combination of weekly calls with the service and online guidance. The aim of these interventions is to help parents and carers guide their young person to feel braver ad happier in overcoming their worry or fear. York Class

A busy week in York Class! We have been learning about the parts of our body in year 1 and the importance of brushing our teeth in Reception. In maths, measurement has been a focus. Reception have been weighing using non standard measurements and year 1 are using non standard units to measure length. In English we are learning our focus texts. Reception have focused on the story Brown Bear by Eric Carle and Year 1 have been learning a non fiction text about dogs.

Winchester Class

Winchester class have worked very hard this week and they have been demonstrating key skills such as perseverance and determination. In English, we have been continuing with our letter writing and we have been looking at all the features and what to include in our own writing. In maths, we have continued learning about money and we have started our topic on multiplication — make sure you ask your children what skills they have learned so far! This term we will be learning about habitats in science and practising our drawing sills in art.



Exeter Class

This week Exeter class have been working hard on our non-chronological reports. We have researched Henry VIII and the Tudor period and selected information for our own writing. We are particularly interested in famous Tudors, Tudor houses, Tudor food and Tudor animals. We have also learnt about how children were treated in school! We have enjoyed playing basket ball in PE this week and learnt lots of new dribbling skills, including: the basic dribble, side yo-yo and dribbling through our legs.

Durham

This week in Durham, we have been diving into our new English genre: Non-chronological reports. We have analysed different, high-quality non-chronological reports in order to identify the key features and structures needed. From this we have then used the 'box it up' method, to plan our own non-chronological report, which will be based on a magical creature from our key text 'Skellig'. The children have been thoroughly enthused by this text and are eager to find out what 'Skellig' is, as all we know so far is that, Michael, our protagonist, has found him in his garage, looking rather filthy, pale and dried out. In History, we have begun our new topic of the Ancient Maya, where the children have created maps and located where the Mayan civilisation lived and what countries can be found there now. Next week, we have got our library trip, which the children are very excited for!

Rochester



This week we have been starting lots of new things. In PE we have found our sense of rhythm and crated simple 8 beat routines. We were thinking about how we can improve our steps and make the routines more fluid. On Tuesday we took a



trip to Rusthall Library. The whole class behaved fantastically and

were excited by the range of books. We asked the librarian lots of questions and chose a book to read together. In reading we have been reading an infographic book all about the



Ancient Maya. Our focus has been on our retrieval skills and as a result we have learned a lot about the Mya. Did you know they believed if they ate the heart of a warrior, they would gain their strength? This is also helping us prepare for our English outcome- a non-chronological report on the Maya.
