KS2 Roof

In case anyone missed the letter:

As you are likely aware, there have been some missing tiles on the KS2 roof for some time. Over time, this has caused water damage to some of the beams. To ensure the safety and comfort of our children it has been decided that the roof on the oldest part of the KS2 building needs to be replaced. This essential maintenance work will begin at the end of this week with the scaffolding being erected on Friday afternoon. It is anticipated that the work will take 3-4 weeks, 1 of which will be the half term.

During this period, there may be some temporary disruption in certain areas of the school. The pedestrian gate will still be accessible and therefore drop off and collection arrangements remain unchanged. However, access to the KS2 building through the activities hall will be suspended until the work is completed. Children will be able to access their classrooms through their class doors as normal. However, we will be using the door closest to the PE store to be able to enter and exit the building. Today Miss Sheldrake held an assembly with the children to share these changes so that they know what to expect and are not unsettled by this work. Please do speak to your

children about this and let the school know if this has caused any worries.

Early Bird Course

NAS EarlyBird Plus (ages four-nine) is a support programme for parents and carers created by the National Autistic Society (NAS), offering advice and guidance on strategies and approaches to working with children with autism spectrum conditions. The programmes work on understanding autism, building confidence to encourage interaction and communication, and understanding and supporting behaviour. Forest School

What a difference a week makes! The frost from last week had disappeared and we were met with some warm winter sun on our faces. The children began by sharing gratitude. Lots of children named their friends. We played a game about the willow tree which was fun, even for the adults! We then gathered around the fire circle and I talked to the children about how to make charcoal using foraged willow. However, for this we needed a good fire and we simply couldn't get one going this week! Lots of learning happened here, as we discussed why it wasn't working and what we needed to try. We saw lots of perseverance from two very patient children! The rest of the group made a couple of fantastic dens using the tarps. One was on the ground and the other up higher, in amongst the trees. Some children made more bird feeders and put them high into the trees. Other children had a great time playing in the mud kitchen. A super session!

Class



Reception have been using the book Polar Bear Polar Bear what do you hear this week. They have been listening to different sounds and thinking about how you can describe them. They have written new pages for the book about what they can hear. They

have used the puppets to retell the story. In maths they have been working on measures and sorting objects into long and short. Year 1 have continued their work on reports and have been writing reports all about humans. They are working hard to write independently

using the skills they have learnt. In maths Year 1 have continued with their work on numbers from 11 to 20. They have looked at different ways to represent the numbers including by drawing. In their experience work this week they have been thinking about the importance of washing their hands. They have set up an experiment looking at germs and how they grow using slices of bread. They are looking forward to observing what happens.

Winchester Class Winchester class have continued working hard across the curriculum this week. In art, we

have been learning to create 3D drawings by developing our sketching skills. We are in the process of producing some beautiful sketches of trees. In English, we are writing poems and we have included similes and repetition in our poems. In maths, we are continuing to work hard on our topic of multiplication and on our topic of money. We have been finding different ways of making the same amount of money. Hopefully the children are enjoying telling you about their learning at home too!

Exeter Class



Exeter loved their trip to the library this week. When we arrived, we were shown where the fiction and non-fiction books were kept. We

then spent time reading and sharing the books before picking one to take back to class. These we are our Reading for Pleasure books. We have enjoyed Reader's Theatre this week. In English we

have designed a creature based on a character in our book The Snow Walker's Son and are now writing a report about it. We are focusing on its appearance,

where it lives and any special features it has.

Durham

This week in Durham we have been consolidating our knowledge of non-chronological reports, where the children have been applying their understanding and skills to their own reports based on a magical and mythical creature that they have created, which were inspired by our text 'Skellig.' I have been amazed to see the children's creativity flourishing through their character designs and how they have applied their knowledge of This Week: 98.33% generalisers, complex sentences and varied punctuation, such as, dashes, colons and semi-This Year: 93.27% colons into their own reports. The children will be finalising their publishing of their nonchronological reports, before we move onto newspaper articles next week. In History, we created timelines where we mapped the Maya civilisation against the time periods within British History, before using research to identify how the city structures, temples and pyramids changed over the Maya period. In P.E, we have continued to build on our knowledge of Dance actions and have begun to apply these to sequences. The children were very creative when working in groups to use balances, gestures and movements to make objects.

Rochester

This week we have really got stuck into our History unit the Maya. We built on our knowledge of where they established their settings and looked at how this evolved over time. The Maya timeline is split into 3 key sections, Pre-Classic, Classic and Post- Classic. In each time many cities rose and fell but we found the most established and advanced were the classic era. We then became historians ourselves and looked at drawings from early historians to see what we could learn. Catherwood draw fantastic, accurate scenes of whet he found in Mesoamerica. He used a Camera Lucida for procession. We were able to see the great architecture in their buildings, the detail in the statues and the magnitude of their pyramids. We were most amazed by the length of the ladders they built to reach the natural underground water stores. We have then applied our learning to writing our non-chronological reports on the Maya.
