Thought for the Week

Get your children thinking by talking about this week's discussion questions: What makes someone inspirational?

Mar Galcerán, an advocate for inclusivity, made history as Spain's first legislator

with <u>Down syndrome</u>. The 45-year-old voted to Valencia's regional assembly, reflects on her path, and emphasizes the importance of being recognized for more than just her impairment. Galcerán's political career began at the age of 18 when she joined the conservative People's Party (PP), enticed by its traditionalist values. Years of dedication paid off in May, when she secured the 20th slot on the PP's candidate list for Valencia's regional elections, resulting in her historic feat. Carlos Mazón, the regional PP leader, celebrated her victory on social media, calling it "great news for politics, overcoming barriers." Galcerán's victory places her among the few

people with Down syndrome to have entered politics.

Early Bird Course

NAS EarlyBird Plus (ages four-nine) is a support programme for parents and carers created by the National Autistic Society (NAS), offering advice and guidance on strategies and approaches to working with children with autism spectrum conditions.

The programmes work on understanding autism, building confidence to encourage interaction and communication, and understanding and supporting behaviour.

Spurgeons' Parent Support Workers are licensed to offer this course which aims to empower parents to understand more about autism.

How much does the EarlyBird Plus course cost?

This is a free course, but Spurgeons would welcome a donation of £40 to cover our Parent Support Worker's time and the costs of the material supplied.

Forest School


In Forest school this week we went to our magical place on Rusthall Common. The children listened to a reading about Imbolc, a Celtic festival in the wheel of the year, which celebrates the mid way point between winter solstice and spring equinox (1st/2nd February). The children made beeswax candles, using clay for the base. We then melted the beeswax over the fire and carefully poured the wax into the clay, holding onto the wick so it stayed central.

The children really enjoy the freedom on forest school and played a very enthusiastic game of hide and seek. Some children chose to paint and others played with the birds and continued work on their den. At the end of the session we gathered in a circle and lit our candles to make wishes for spring time and the return of the light. Spring is on its way!



This week in York we have had a Design Technology focus. We began the week by learning a poem called Chips! After tasting different fruits and vegetables Reception wrote a new poem called fruits! and Year 1 wrote their own poems, they looked at using adjectives and following the structure to create their own verses. Reception have learnt to use a knife and fork and how to cut where

as year 1 have used tools to peel, grate and chop. On Friday we finished our week by applying our skills. Reception made rice cracker faces and Year 1 made fruit kebabs. The best part as you can imagine was the eating at the end!!

Winchester Class

Winchester class have had a very exciting week. On Tuesday we made our first class visit to the Library. The children enjoyed sharing books with their friends and then getting to borrow a book of their own that they can read in school. We also read some of our class story which had them all mesmerised and they were very sad when we had to stop to get back to school. In Art the children have continued to work on their 3D drawing and

have learnt the features of a landscape picture. They are now looking at how to draw in









perspective. They are finding some elements tricky but are all persevering and are creating some lovely work in preparation for their final piece. Math's has seen us start to learn our times tables and begin to see how division and multiplication facts are linked which we will be continuing next week.

Exeter Class

This week Exeter class have been writing their own reports on an imaginary creature they have created. We focused on describing its appearance, habitat and special features. In maths we have been working on our multiplication skills and have begun using a written method to solve more complex multiplications. PE has been great fun: putting a sequence of movements together in dance and learning to shoot in basketball.



Durham

This week in Durham we have begun to look at newspaper articles in English. We have spent time unpicking the features of a high-equality article as readers, before text mapping to help us retell it. We've then unpicked key ingredients and language features as writers, which has been fantastic in helping the children to see the structure of different sentence types, the formal language which is used and how punctuation can be applied for effect. After we did this, we used the 'box it up' planning method to further look at how our example article is put together and what the writer has used within the beginning, middle and ending. These steps are key to helping the children understand the organisational features and language features of a newspaper article and will support them in writing their own articles next week on the Maya. In History, we deepened our knowledge and understanding of the Maya and how they used temples and pyramids. We found out that some of the pyramids they built were like Russian nesting dolls and were actually built one on top of the other - an excellent example of this is El Castillo. Next week, we will be writing newspaper articles in role as journalists who are reporting on a Maya site being found, where the children will explain how Historians have used artefacts to piece together information about Maya civilisations.
