Expanded Childcare Parental Survey

You may be aware that in the Spring Budget 2023 the Government announced the expansion of the Early Education and Childcare Entitlements in include children of working families from nine months upwards. At the same time, it announced the expansion of Wraparound Provision for Primary school aged children.

NAS EarlyBird Plus (ages four-nine) is a support programme for parents and carers created by the National Autistic Society (NAS), offering advice and guidance on strategies and approaches to working with children with autism spectrum conditions.

The programmes work on understanding autism, building confidence to encourage interaction and communication, and understanding and supporting behaviour.

How much does the EarlyBird Plus course cost? This is a free course, but donations of £40 are warmly welcomed.

Where can I attend the course?

Up to 10 families will attend a course, sharing their lived experiences, ideas and strategies. The courses run either online as Teams meetings or in-person (currently available in Kent, Surrey and Sussex).

Forest School



Mud, mud, glorious mud! Our final Forest school session was the wettest we've had this term and therefore the muddlest! After arriving at the site on the common we shared some gratitude with each other. We then got straight into learning a couple of knots to help us put up small tarp shelters. I wonder if your children can show you? We learnt a 'timber hitch' and a 'taut tarp hitch'.

The children worked well in their groups to get their tarps up. Some children chose to do something fire lighting. Not easy in wet weather! They very quickly realised they had to use their body to give some protection

to the sparks and this worked well. One child spotted a little mouse this week which was very exciting. It didn't take long for the children to find a slope, clear the branches out of the way and begin to slide down it. Another child realised there was a 'tap' with water running quickly from a tree. They grabbed a saucepan and began filling it up and used the water to tip on the mud slide, to make it even more slippery. After realising that getting clean was going to take some time this week, we came back to school a little earlier

than normal and had our hot squash and biscuit in the classroom.

The children have been brilliant. Well done everyone.

York Class



This week York Class have started new texts in English. Year 1 are learning about the adventures of Claude in the city and Reception have been exploring The Train Ride. On Tuesday York Class had their first visit to Rusthall Library, we learnt how the books were organised and

how we use the library. We have a class library card so each child was able to choose a book to bring back and share in class. In phonics we have continued to work on learning our sounds.

Reception have now learnt one way to make each of the 44 sounds in the English language and Year 1 are working hard on learning all the alternatives.

| Durham As part of Mental Health Awareness Week, we thought about how we can help ourselves when we are feeling negative. We discussed how thinking about the things we are grateful for can improve our mental health as it changes our mindset and focuses on positives. The children created 'The World Through My Eyes' posters, where they thought about what they were grateful for in their lives. We discussed the skills, hobbies and qualities of ourselves that make us unique and special and recognised how these should be celebrated and shared. In English this week, we used the 'Box It Up' planning method to create a plan for a newspaper article about Skellig being found. The children then used these to write newspaper articles and I have been astounded with the vocabulary, sentence structure and effectiveness of their writing. After half term, the children will be consolidating their knowledge of newspaper articles by writing a completely independent article about an ancient Maya site being discovered. | This Week: 97.5% This Year: 94,17% |
